"Developmentally appropriate" describes an approach to teaching that respects both the age and the individual needs of each child. The idea is that the program should fit the child; the child shouldn't have to fit the program! Preschool teachers look at the "whole child," including intellectual, social, emotional, physical, and creative growth.

Activity: What is Developmentally Appropriate Practice? DAP means waiting until a child is ready to acquire new skills. No, it means setting appropriate expectations that would be considered DAP, but there may be individual differences that also need to be taken into consideration. Using everyday routines and activities to enhance learning is DAP.

Understanding Developmentally Appropriate Practice

Developmentally appropriate practice has two components: age and individuality. Age appropriateness refers to the universal physical, emotional, and cognitive predictable changes in children. Lessons are based on developmental readiness. Individual appropriateness reminds us that each child has a unique pattern and calendar of growth.
