The most important observations of the patellar position are made with the patient seated on the examination table, the legs hanging free and the knees flexed to 90°. The examiner first assesses the patellar position and the position of the tibial tuberosity and patellar ligament by viewing the knee from the lateral aspect.

There are many such clinical orthopedic tests that target the various regions of the body and many tissue types including connective tissue, muscles, nerves, bones ...

clinical examination. In contrast, when patients state exactly what is expected and normal for a comparable case, there is certainly no reason to doubt their reliability; nor will a search for possible psychoneurotic components be necessary. Patients devoid of a physical cause will rarely escape

detection if the history is properly taken.

**36 - Clinical examination of the lumbar spine**

Look for any ptosis by measuring the margin-to-reflex distance, which is the distance from the corneal light reflex to the margin of the upper lid. Look for lagophthalmos. Note any unusual growths or lesions that may require a biopsy. Palpate lymph nodes and the temporal artery if indicated by the history or exam.

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
